



#### FFA Foodbank Honations

## South Central Kansas Novse Judging Event

The Wellington FFA Chapter competed in the South Central District Horse Judging Career Development Event at Kingman. They learned how to judge horses based on their confirmation, and also on how they perform being ridden in various performance events. They applied the skills by judging six classes of horses and giving oral reasons of why they placed the horses the way they did.

This year is the first year for 8th graders from Wellington to be able to be FFA members and to compete. There were 14 WMS 8th graders that competed.

Junior Division (8th grade)-2nd Place out of 8 teams Jade Pearson-1st, Katelyn Kessler-6th, Landyn Glenn-14th, and Kenny Redford-20th. There were 40 individuals competing
