Don't be a party to teenage drinking.

It's against the law.

After collaborating with SCCDAT staff, Wellington High School students in the Crusader Way (Lions Quest) class chose Sticker Shock as their community service project. Students learned that the goal of the project is to educate

adults who might provide alcohol to youth about the law that prohibits furnishing alcohol to minors. Students from WHS delivered paper bags with warning stickers already placed on them to participating liquor stores as well as hangers with similar warnings to place on multi -packs of beer, wine coolers and other alcoholic beverages. These stickers and hangers warn purchasers that it is illegal to provide alcohol to minors. USD 353 SRO Office Jim Yunker/SADD Sponsor/ SCCDAT Law Enforcement Sector Rep talked with the team of students and accompanied them to the liquor stores to distribute the supplies. Students planned and carried out the project under the direction of Office Yunker, Karla Defore (Crusader Way teacher) and SCCDAT Staff.

SCCDAT is always looking to increase our coalition membership. Data from the Kansas Communities That Care (KCTC) survey reflect the seven school districts that make up Sumner County have had a significant reduction in the 30-Day Prevalence of alcohol use. School districts in Sumner County have participated in the KCTC survey since 1995, reporting the highest evidence of use in 1999 with a percentage of students in grades 6, 8, 10, and 12 reporting past 30-day use of alcohol at 44.92%. The 2016 percentage of 16.50% reflects a 28.42 percentage point reduction in 30-day alcohol use among youth. SCCDAT is confident that the prevention and awareness efforts by the coalition throughout the county have been a contributing factor in this reduction.
