Purpose of Student Driven Learning


- Students drive the content and/or the process (individually or collaboratively).
- Students don't have to start and stop at the same place or follow the same pathway.
- Students self assess, set goals, create plans to meet goals, and progress along learning path.
- Students have ownership of their learning.
- Students have choice on resources and learn how they learn best.

Examples of Student-Driven

- Stations (based on skill need or interest)
- Group work on project
- Student-led workshops
- Peer tutoring
- Study and show evidence of learning
- Evaluating and reflecting on learning


What Student Driven Looks Like in the Classroom

- Students create a plan to accomplish those goals.










What Student Driven Looks Like in the Classroom
